University administration dives into Futures Thinking and Strategic Foresight workshop



Tarlac State University's executives and Administrative Council members, composed of deans and directors, gathered at the Alumni Center in Lucida Campus to attend the two-day workshop on Futures Thinking.

Titled "Framing the Futures: Cultivating Foresight in Administrative Leadership," the sessions held from December 13-14, 2023 at the Lucinda Campus Alumni Center featured lectures and activities dedicated to identifying TSU's focal concern in the coming years that the government would potentially fund.

"TSU will be one of the SUCs to be at the forefront in addressing the SDGs (UN Sustainable Development Goals) and will be one of the vessels of salvation for the country," Mr. Noel De Guia, Resident Futurist of the Senate Committee on Sustainable Development Goals, Innovations, and Futures Thinking (SDGIFT), said in his provocation.

Mr. De Guia emphasized that the Futures Thinking initiatives of TSU, similar to what other state universities and colleges had started, could help address the country's problems.

TSU President Dr. Arnold E. Velasco welcomed the idea of Futures Thinking in providing solutions to pressing issues while making a niche for TSU, resonating with the statements from life. Mr. De Guia.

"Through this workshop, magkakaroon tayo ng foresight... we will not just be thinking about the future but also about disparities and how we can counter them. We really have to counter this VUCA (vulnerable, uncertain, complex, ambiguous) world," he said.

Pres. Velasco also mentioned that the workshop is part of SDGIFT Chairperson Sen. Pia Cayetano's appropriated funds for Futures Thinking and Strategic Foresight capacity-building activities from 2022 to present.

Resource speaker Prof. Jalaine Joyce Malabanan from the Polytechnic University of the Philippines delivered lectures on megatrends, trends, and drivers of change, where she established Futures Thinking and Foresight as a systematic way of thinking about the future with a long-term and mid-term timeline.

She also underscored that Futures Thinking is not fortune-telling and that sound analysis must be employed. "Walang mawawala sa'yo kung

gagawin mo ang Futures Thinking," Prof. Malabanan said when she likened the topic to disaster preparedness. She also discussed the

foundation for rational deliberation and appropriate action in public as well as in private life. It requires responsibility and blame. It is not always [about] kindness. We do not tolerate the wrong action," she added.

Meanwhile, Dr. Michville Rivera further laid the groundwork for Futures Thinking and Strategic Foresight through lectures and activities on Causal Layered Analysis (CLA).

He emphasized the importance of creating alternative scenarios, considering emerging issues among stakeholders, and defining the university's focal concern that addresses a specific SDG.

Moreover, he introduced the new VUCA that could guide the university in Futures Thinking - vision, understanding, clarity, and agility.

He looks forward to having another Futures Thinking workshop with TSU in 2024 to guide the university in crafting its proposal.

Dr. Rivera is the president of the Association of Schools of Public Administration in the Philippines Inc. (ASPAP) and the dean of Pamantasan ng Lungsod ng Valenzuela's College of Public Administration and Governance. He also completed a postgraduate certificate course in Futures Thinking and Foundations of Knowledge Management at the Development Academy of the "Compassion provides a good Philippines, among others.

Moreover, 200 students will receive 7,500 pesos of cash aid under the Commission on Higher Education's Tulong Dunong Program, amounting to 12 million pesos.

arlac State University's School of Law honored its 2023 Bar Examination passers in a testimonial dinner held on December 21, 2023 at the Kaisa Convention Hall, Tarlac City.

Atty. Ray John Dorig, who ranked first among the 22 passers with a 84.63% average, received a 50 sq.m. land from Atty. Karen Cayetano-Tinoyan as his incentive. He also excelled in Public International Law during the Bar exam.

Similarly, the 22 passers each received 30,000 pesos cash incentives from the university and some awards from SOL.

incentive, the top ten passers of TSU were also granted a 10,000-peso cash gift from the Tenorio Law Office, wherein Atty. Dorig was followed by Atty. Danielle Mangune, one of the first cum laude graduates of SOL in July 2023, who recorded an average of 82.83%

SOL Dean Dr. Jose I. de la Rama Jr. shared that he was in New York when the Bar results came out.

"I was so afraid; I was trembling in fear. I was crying alone inside my room. I asked myself, 'Will I be able to make it this time? Will I make TSU proud of our performance? Or are we going to humiliate the TSU to the community? But when I read (the results) and when they started scrolling the names one by one, I was jumping for joy because 22 TSU law students made it to the Bar exam," Dean de la Rama said in his speech.

TSU attained an overall performance of 40.74%, with 19 passers among its first-time takers, per the statistical data from the Supreme Court Aside from the university's of the Philippines. This is the secondhighest number of TSU Bar passers following the 2020/21 Bar examinations, with 26 passers and one exemplary passer. her second take.
