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TSU enters global collab with South Korean university

arlac State University and Daegu Haany University, based in South Korea, inked a partnership for faculty and student mobility in early childhood education at the Main AVR on January 21, 2025.

With this two-year partnership, both universities will collaborate on faculty and staff mobility, the English Language Proficiency Program (ELPP), and

cultural exchange.

According to Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Agnes M. Macaraeg, the partnership will benefit the Early Childhood Education program under the College of Education regarding internationalization efforts for its program accreditation and the university's SUC leveling.

Part of the faculty

mobility is an exchange program that will be conducted for special courses through seminars, lectures, workshops, and training.

Moreover, the partner universities will collaborate to share their best practices in line with their inclination of services and processes.

Per the agreement, TSU will assign faculty

members to teach in the ELPP, where international students will also be immersed in Filipino culture.

"I hope to see a deep collaboration between our two universities in research, student exchange, and culture exchange... I hope this will (be a) meaningful opportunity for us to learn more about [the] Philippines' culture

arlac State University, **L** through its Center for Community and Local Governance Studies and Policy Development, entered into a partnership with barangays Baras-Baras and Sinait in Tarlac City to strengthen youth governance and local policy development.

The partnership was formalized through a memorandum of agreement signing held on January 22, 2025 at the Main AVR.

Through Project KAPABILD (Kabataan Advancement: Profiling, Consultancy, and Capacity Building Initiatives for the SK and KK in Baras-Baras, Tarlac City), the



CCLGSPD and the College of Public Administration and Governance will provide assistance and consultancy for data collection and analysis in profiling the Katipunan ng Kabataan to formulate and implement programs and services attuned to the issues and concerns of the barangay's youth.

Last April 13, 2024, CCLGSPD and CPAG already conducted the project's phase I, where they gathered data and information about the youth's status in the barangay.

Moreover, TSU will also conduct capacity-building activities for Sangguniang Kabataan youth leaders and the Katipunan ng Kabataan



to enhance their competence and skills, focusing on the ten centers of youth formation.

Additionally, advocacy materials promoting youth empowerment and development will be developed under this initiative.

Meanwhile, Project AKAP (Aksyon Kaagapay ang Pamahalaan Project), piloted in Brgy. Sinait, aims to strengthen local governance and policy development through capacitybuilding activities for barangay leaders to improve their governance and leadership skills.

As part of the project, a barangay database system will be developed to streamline processing requests from

barangay beneficiaries.

Brgy. Chair Mario B. Sapad of Baras-Baras and Brgy. Chair Catalina P. Tonelada III of Sinait thanked the TSU community for its continuous support and assistance to their barangays.

"Rest assured po na ang partnership na ito ay hindi lamang po sa ballpen dahil pagsisikapin po namin ng council, SK, at ng mga mamamayan ng Sinait na maisakatuparan ang programang ito sa pinakamataas na antas. Ipapakita po namin na ito ay magtatagumpay para po sa ikakaunlad ng aming barangay," Hon. Tonelada said.

Two hundred fifty-seven graduates were conferred with their respective degrees during the 36th Commencement Exercises of Tarlac State University on January 24, 2025 at the TSU Gymnasium.

The graduates completed their degrees during the first semester of the academic year 2024-2025.

Rhea W. Sales, a cum laude graduate of the Bachelor of Elementary Education with a major in General Education, delivered the valedictory speech for this batch.



Sales, the daughter of a modiste and a tricycle driver, shared her struggles and triumphs during her university journey. She recounted moments of doubt, mainly when she had to extend her time at the university after shifting to a different major, which placed an even greater financial burden on her parents.

"The thought of my parents' struggles weighed

heavily on me. I often found myself wondering, 'Will I ever reach the finish line, or will I ever be able to give back to them the life they deserve?'" the batch valedictorian said.

Apart from this, Sales also spoke about the challenges of being an irregular student, which sometimes left her feeling isolated. She recalled moments of uncertainty, eating alone, sitting quietly in empty classrooms, and navigating group projects without the comfort of a consistent circle.

"Despite being an irregular student, I was able to not only reach my dreams but surpass even my own expectations...Let my story stand as a beacon of hope that no matter where you start, no matter how winding the path, you can achieve your dreams and sometimes even go beyond what you dared to imagine," she added.

Sales dedicated her success to her family, expressing gratitude for her parents' sacrifices.

"Every stitch you made, every ride you gave—it all built the path that led me here," she said

Apart from Sales, another notable graduate from this batch is Dr. Ruth D. Jimenez, the current DepEd Tarlac City Schools Division School Governance and Operations Division chief.

As the resource person, he gave the participants 11 activities to assess their current needs and situations in their colleges.

He emphasized the learner's well-being, transparency in learning targets, and the teachers' responsibility.

Dr. Jugar also noted that the non-academic and support staff should also be oriented in planning and balancing the different curriculum and program offerings.

Moreover, he said teachers must have a digital detox while doing their work.

CBA's lone doctoral program reaches Level 3 AACCUP re-accreditation

The Doctor of Business Administration program under the College of Business and Accountancy formally received its Level III Re-Accreditation certificate from the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines last January 28, 2025 through the Office of Quality Assurance.

Based on the summary of findings presented by OQA Director Dr. Niño B. Corpuz, the program achieved a grand mean of 4.0, with all key areas—instruction, research, faculty development, and extension—garnering 4.0 ratings.

"Indeed, there is value in perseverance. Sa wakas, the long-awaited re-accreditation award is now here with us. With our teamwork and the joint energy we have in the college, nothing is impossible," Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Agnes M. Macaraeg said in her opening message, reflecting on the program's two-year journey to reaccreditation.

Moreover, Dr. Corpuz said the program reached the required grand mean during its initial survey visit in 2022 but was given mandatory



requirements to fulfill.

In 2023, the program addressed its other requirements, and by August 2024, it achieved full compliance, earning its Level III Re-Accreditation.

"Hindi biro ang pinagdaanan ng graduate program... Ngayon naman ay magsisimula na ang journey for the higher level. Sabi nga nila, 'when much is given, much is expected," Dr. Corpuz said.

In her acceptance message, CBA Dean Dr. Jhonel C. Panlilio emphasized the collective efforts of the college in achieving the milestone.

"It's a manifestation

na lahat ng ginagawa natin sa ating college ay may katumbas at tama ang ating ginagawa sa pagtuturo pati na rin sa ating pagre-research," she said.

Moreover, Dr. Elizabeth A. Amurao, CBA graduate program chairperson, called for continued support from the faculty and staff.

"Sana huwag po tayong magsawa kasi habang nandito tayo ay kailangan ng ating program ang ating cooperation at pagmamalasakit," Dr. Amurao said.

The DBA program's Level III Re-Accreditation status is valid until August 2028.

Tarlac State University's Office of University Legal Counsel, in collaboration with the Provincial Government of Tarlac, organized a forum on the New Government Procurement Act (Republic Act No. 12009) last January 31, 2025 at the Carlos P. Romulo Library.

The activity, titled "Jurisprudence and Doctrines on Procurement Law RA 12009," aims to provide government employees and legal practitioners with updated knowledge on procurement processes and ensure compliance with the newly implemented procurement law.

As the resource speaker, Hon. Elmira S. Cruz-Caisido, presiding judge of Regional Trial Court Camiling Branch 68, discussed the provisions of RA 12009, emphasizing its key differences from the previous Government Procurement Reform Act (RA 9184). She also highlighted the critical responsibilities of the Bids and Awards Committee (BAC) in reviewing procurement documents to ensure transparency and accountability in government transactions.

Additionally, Hon.
Caisido tackled the newly
introduced Beneficial Ownership
Declaration, which requires
bidders to disclose ownership
details to identify the ultimate
owner and prevent collusion in

public procurement processes.

The forum was organized in response to a request from the local government of Concepcion through its municipal legal counsel, Atty. Myla Matic.

Attendees include lawyers from various state universities and colleges (SUCs) in Central Luzon, along with BAC members of courts, SUCs, Tarlac LGUs, and TSU School of Law students.

TSU powerlifters powers through competitions, hurdles

Tarlac State University
Powerlifters ranked
third overall in the National
Interschool and Novice
Powerlifting Cup held at the
Centro Hall of Sta. Lucia Mall in
Manila last January 17-19, 2025.

Ken Andrey Austria, a fourth-year marketing student from the College of Business and Accountancy, broke a record and won a gold medal in the men's 105kg college category. Austria was also given a College National Record for lifting the heaviest weight during the competition.

Another gold medal was brought home by Vince Gerald Gutierrez, a first-year law student, who competed in the men's 83kg college category.

Austria and Vince Gerald are set to join the Asian University Cup, an international competition in India that will be held in May.

Moreover, first-timer Arron Bautista, a second-year nursing student, bagged a bronze medal under the men's 105kg novice category, while Lisha Mae Gutierrez, a fourth-year secondary education student and pioneering female member of the TSU Powerlifters, won two silvers in the novice and college categories under 47kg.

"Sabi nila 'Excellence is when you break a standard,' 'yun daw ang definition ng excellence. When you can break, you can go further beyond your standards. Natutuwa ako dahil meron tayong ganito sa TSU, we are proud of all your achievements," TSU President Dr. Arnold E. Velasco told the athletes during their courtesy visit last January 23

The University of the Philippines ranked first in the competition, followed by the Our Lady of Fatima University in Pampanga.

This is the first national competition of the TSU Powerlifters, with 14 out of 28 members representing the university together with Mr. Hilario Romen III, coach, and Mr. Wesley Equila, assistant coach.

The team is aiming to send more delegates to succeeding competitions.

National competition journey

Lisha, who garnered two silver medals, shared that she held back her tears during her last attempt at deadlift.

Instead, she bowed before the crowd and only cried when she saw her teammates.

"Di ko po talaga masabi na successful e, kasi ini-aim ko po talaga 'yung gold. Kini-crave ko 'yung gold, parang kinondisyon ko 'yung sarili ko na if not gold, 'wag na lang. 'Yung mga projected ko na weights, hindi sila lumitaw. Hindi ko rin po nabuhat yung 100kg sa deadlift na dati ko namang nabubuhat sa gym. So, sabi ko, silver na lang. Pinapakawalan ko na 'yung

gold," Lisha said in an interview. However, the female

powerlifter is keen on improving for the following competitions.

"Iri-redeem ko naman po 'yung sarili ko. Pero papalakas muna po ako kasi medyo alanganin. Pero ganoon naman talaga sa sports. Nandoon pa rin naman 'yung dedication ko, 'yung passion ko, atsaka hunger for gold," Lisha added.

On the other hand, Lisha and Vince's other sibling, Zyrus Gervi Gutierrez, an elementary education student, fell short of winning a medal.

Zyrus, Caedmon Dyre Catalan from the College of Business and Accountancy, and Francis Benedict Quito from the College of Computer Studies experienced difficulties during the weigh-ins, prompting them to abruptly lose weight to match their first weigh-in results.

Cogs in the TSU machine

Although the university ended 2024 positively due to its collective achievements, uncertainty still clouds over its rank-and-file employees, especially those whose tenure is not yet sealed tight with a permanent plantilla.

With the financial setbacks, the university made crucial and heart-wrenching decisions to downsize contractual plantilla holders. It has also been studying the population of job order employees vis-a-vis their daily tasks. Trusting the hiring officials' wisdom, expertise, and experience, they would not seek the services of these

employees if the office does not need them. Hence, from the perspective of affected offices, it would seem futile to study the nitty-gritty of each one's daily activities. However, in hindsight, the observable reality of the university's situation regarding financial health cannot be taken for granted and must be warranted with prompt action.

The core of the employees affected by this decision is the non-teaching sector. Almost half of the 1,470 TSU employees recorded in 2023, including teaching and non-teaching staff, are part of the affected sector. From this data,

511 are with contractual plantilla and job order status. Some of these employees consider TSU their bread and butter, their primary source of income to support their respective families. Moreover, TSU can be viewed as a major employer in the Tarlac Province. Reducing their number could result in a significant loss in the province's employment rate and, most notably, might lead to increased poverty.

Then again, the interests of each sector involved must be balanced. Sustaining the university's operations demands budget, and a "business decision" must be established. But should

it always be the people who must bear the burden? Could there be other means to make the budget work without sacrificing the nonredundant workforce?

As cogs in a machine, each employee's contribution aids in making the university work. The leadership should ensure the machine is well-oiled to run its daily operations. With crucial and heart-wrenching decisions, how can the university patch things up with the affected sectors? An explanation from the administration is anticipated to iron out the situation.

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As a result, they felt a little weaker during the competition, given their small food intake and few hours of sleep.

In addition, he started conditioning himself for the Luzon Regionals in April with Quito, who is also into bodybuilding and was once a duathlon athlete.

Meanwhile, some members are also preparing for the Central and Northern competition in September this year.

Yet, according to team captain Austria, some members

hesitate to join competitions due to financial constraints since their training would require athletes to shell out money for the right equipment, among other expenses.

"Maraming nagtryout sa team, kaso 'yun lang 'yung mga main points, hindi lahat mapo-provide in terms of financial (matters). Kaya 'yung mag-join lang sila, 'yung matapak lang sila sa platform, big achievement na 'yun kahit wala silang nakuhang medal, 'yung nag-show up lang sila," Austria told OPA.

Aside from financial concerns, the eldest Gutierrez said stress was a significant factor during their preparation and training. Like their body, they also need to train their minds to focus on the competition while balancing academics.

Regarding female recruitment, the powerlifting team now has two new lady lifters joining Lisha.
